Significant Activity

1 October- LEADs (Law Enforcement Against Drugs & Violence) Program restarted at Austin Peay Elementary, Drummonds Elementary, and Tipton Christian Academy. Conducted every Mon, Wed, Thu at Austin Peay, every Fri at Drummonds, and TCA (Tipton Christian Academy). LEADs is a program that partners Law Enforcement with educators, community leaders, and families by providing proven and effective programs to deter youth and adults from drug use, drug related crimes, bullying and violence. We are committed to reinforcing the mutual respect, goodwill and relations between law enforcement and their communities.

4 October- Captain John Weatherly attended a Critical Incident Stress Debriefing in Hardin County, TN. Critical Incident Stress Debriefing is a peer-driven support group for officers who have been involved in a critical incident. A critical incident is any event that is outside the typical range of experience for a person; and has sufficient impact (or is likely to have sufficient impact) in that it overwhelms the person's usual effective coping abilities. Typical critical incidents would include, but not be limited to: line-of-duty deaths, incidents involving the use of deadly force or other life-threatening decisions, and serious line-of-duty injuries to self or coworker(s), to name a few.

During the operations, law enforcement officers issued ten citations and warnings. These citations were issued for violations including Speeding, No Seatbelt, Vehicle Registration, Financial Responsibility, and Equipment Violations.
